Other key programs and services provided by the Alliance included the Voluntary Exclusion Program, also known as the List of Disassociated Persons (DAP) for casino patrons, the Self-Exclusion Program (SEP) for Lottery players and free compulsive gambling treatment services. Statistics for each of these services can be found inside this publication.

The Alliance will continue to work on these various programs through 2015, while implementing additional platforms to better serve Missouri citizens and gamblers. We will also begin additional efforts into researching gambling in Missouri, among other endeavors.

As the Alliance's 2015 chairperson, I am eagerly looking forward to working with all of you in hopes of growing our organization to further educate Missouri citizens about problem gambling and assist problem gamblers. Thank you to each and every Alliance member for your continued dedication to problem gambling and to the state of Missouri.

An Overview of the Alliance

The Missouri Alliance to Curb Problem Gambling, which was created in 1997, is a partnership between the Missouri Council on Problem Gambling Concerns Inc., the Missouri Department of Mental Health's Division of Alcohol and Drug Abuse, the Missouri Gaming Association, the Missouri Gaming Commission, the Missouri Lottery, the Port Authority of Kansas City and a recovery community representative.

The purpose of the Alliance is to educate Missourians on the potential characteristics and dangers of problem and compulsive gambling, to refer compulsive gamblers and their family and friends to free treatment through a toll-free help line and/or email address, to prevent underage play and to promote responsible gaming.

Missouri Alliance to Curb Problem Gambling Service Highlights

Problem Gambling Help Line: 1-888-BETSOFF (1-888-238-7633)

Life Crisis Services (LCS) operates a 24-hour help line service for callers seeking help for a gambling problem. The Missouri Gaming Association provides the funding for the help line. LCS received a total of 2,073 calls during calendar year 2014.

Free Compulsive Gambling Treatment Services

The Missouri Department of Mental Health's Division of Alcohol and Drug Abuse contracts with certified compulsive gambling counselors to provide free treatment services to compulsive gamblers and their family members. Family members can access services regardless of whether the problem gambler enters treatment. During calendar year 2014, 537 clients accessed the free treatment services. Individuals seeking referral to a counselor in a specific area can call the help line at 1-888-BETSOFF (1-888-238-7633).

The Bets Off website features a list of Missouri-certified compulsive gambling counselors and information about problem gambling, the Voluntary Exclusion Program, the Missouri Alliance to Curb Problem Gambling, the Bets Off Bulletin and more.

Voluntary Exclusion Program

The Missouri Gaming Commission administers a statewide self-exclusion program for casino patrons who identify as problem and pathological gamblers. The voluntary exclusion program is also known as the List of Disassociated Persons (DAP). A total of 778 individuals were approved for DAP placement during calendar year 2014.

Individuals have the option of choosing to be placed on DAP for a lifetime or temporary exclusion. Additional details can be found at mgc.dps.mo.gov.

Missouri Lottery Self-Exclusion Program

The Missouri Lottery's voluntary Self-Exclusion Program (SEP) is a responsible gaming resource for players who classify themselves as problem or pathological gamblers to reduce the incentive to play Lottery games. It launched Aug. 1, 2013. SEP allows players to enter into voluntary lifetime self-ban agreements with the Lottery, prohibiting those individuals from claiming prizes of more than \$600 and accessing the *My Lottery Players Club*.

SEP agreements can be downloaded at MOLottery.com or obtained at any Lottery office or sent through the mail. Forms must be completed entirely and notarized. Since the inception of SEP, two individuals have signed up for the program.

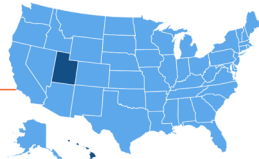

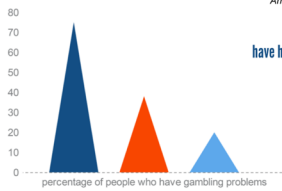

Have the Conversation About Problem Gambling

This past March, members of the Missouri Alliance to Curb Problem Gambling, in conjunction with the National Council on Problem Gambling (NCPG), honored the second annual National Problem Gambling Awareness Month by focusing their efforts to spotlight the issue of problem gambling. The goal of the month-long awareness campaign was to educate the public about the warning signs of problem gambling and promote the availability of help offered locally and nationally.

In addition to promoting the Bets Off services and the “Free Help is on The Horizon” campaign, the Missouri Alliance also distributed a series of public service announcements to radio stations.

“With this campaign, we want to encourage everyone to ‘Have the Conversation about Problem Gambling,’” said Mike Winter, chairperson of the Missouri Alliance and executive director of the Missouri Gaming Association. “Since most adults are aware of gambling or know someone who gambles, we want all Missourians to be aware of the free help that is available to them.”

“On behalf of the Alliance, the Missouri Lottery is continuing distribution of the current ‘Help is on the Horizon’ campaign to be featured via billboards and other publications available to the public,” said May Scheve Reardon, executive director of the Missouri Lottery. “We want to ensure that people who may have a problem are aware of the resources available to them. None of this would be possible without the dedication of the healthcare professionals who specialize in this field.”

On a national level, the NCPG provides free problem gambling screening tools for healthcare professionals in all fields on their website, ncpgambling.org. Additionally, free publicity materials such as a press release, fact sheets, public service announcements, a sample proclamation, media tips and an infographic (featured to the left) can be found on the website.
